- Begin your scholarship search (Green section).

- All applications AND transcripts should be submitted by now.
- Create a calendar of upcoming events & deadlines
- Continue scholarship search
- Take a second look at the schools to which you've been admitted

- In May, complete Senior Survey
- Use Parchment to order Final Transcript "on hold" for grades
- Begin the enrollment process at your school of choice

- Higher admissions rate
- Student surpasses requirements

#### "TARGET" SCHOOLS

- Student has better than 50/50 odds
- · Academic profile fits average student

#### "REACH" SCHOOLS

- Lower admissions rate
- · High academic ranges and requirements

# **Personal Information:**

- Brag on yourself, but not too hard
- Highlight what makes you special or different
- Talk about extracurriculars and academic rigor
- Show your passions

### **Proofread & Meet Deadlines:**

- Be sure to proofread, check for accuracy, proper spelling, capitalization, etc.
- Have a parent or at least one other person proof.
- Be aware & meet deadlines



### THIS IS A GRADUATION REQUIREMENT

### WHAT IS FAFSA?

• FAFSA stands for Free Application for Federal Student Aid.

### WHEN SHOULD YOU COMPLETE FAFSA?

- The application will open **October 1st**
- Awards made until funds are depleted FIRST COME FIRST SERVED!
- College Deadline—Check with the college(s) you are interested in attending.

#### WHERE DO YOU APPLY?

- You must apply online at www.fafsa.gov
- To request a paper application call 1-800-433-3243

### WHAT CAN I DO NOW?

• Students and parents can apply NOW for a FSA ID number at <a href="http://fsaid.ed.gov">http://fsaid.ed.gov</a>.

### WHAT IF I'M UNSURE ABOUT MY PLANS, DO I STILL NEED TO FILL OUT FAFSA?

# Financial Aid FAQ

### Who is eligible to receive federal student aid?

- a U.S. citizen or eligible non-citizen with a high school diploma or GED
- males must be registered with the selective service
- individuals who demonstrate financial need (except for unsubsidized Stafford Loans)

### How much financial aid am I eligible to receive?

- -Eligibility for aid depends on your:
- expected family contribution (EFC)
- year in school
- enrollment status (full time/part time)
- cost of attendance at the school you will be attending



### **Federal Student Aid Programs**

The U.S. Department of Education awards more than \$120 billion a year in grants, work-study funds, and loans to more than 13 million students. *Federal student aid* covers such expenses as tuition and fees, *room and board*, books and supplies, and transportation. Aid also can help pay for other related expenses, such as a computer and dependent care. Thousands of schools across the country participate in the *federal student aid programs*; ask the schools you're interested in whether they do!

### Federal student aid includes:



**Grants** are usually based on financial need and don't have to be repaid.



Loans are an investment in your future. But remember, they must be repaid with interest.



A work-study job lets you earn money while you're in school.

# Scholarships

### **Scholarships Are Everywhere!**

There are inside sources for scholarships and outside sources.

Inside Scholarship Sources: school, place of employment, and local churches/organizations.

The School Counseling Office posts these weekly on our website.

➤ Outside Scholarship Sources: use search engines to find more information on a larger scope.



# Scholarship Tips

- ✓ Be prepared to INVEST time and effort.
- ✓ Look for scholarships provided through your college of choice.
- ✓ Research local <u>FIRST</u>
   (BW Counseling list, unions, membership organizations, parent & student employers).
- ✓ Be sure you meet the qualifications.
- ✓ Online searches are great resources – GOOGLE it!
- ✓ Read the directions CAREFULLY!
- ✓ Be aware of college deadlines and required documents (i.e. admissions, financial aid forms, and scholarships, etc.)

- ✓ Keep letters of
   recommendation and
   transcripts on hand so you
   don't have to request new ones
   for each application.
- ✓ Be neat.
- ✓ Never Pay to Apply.
- ✓ Apply ON TIME!
- ✓ Apply, Apply, Apply! The more you apply, the better your odds.
- ✓ Always be sure all pieces of the application are included (and in the requested order).
- ✓ Prepare a scholarship resume and prepare for interviews.

# Transcript Request

BTHS 201 has partnered with Parchment to send your official transcript quickly and securely to outside institutions.



#### **TEST SCORES**

 State required SAT scores are automatically included on transcripts. Other test scores from National SAT and ACT test dates may not automatically be included.


#### PARENTAL CONSENT/ COMPLIANCE WITH FERPA

- Students under 18 must have a Transcript Release & Consent form signed by a parent or legal guardian on file.
- When a student turns 18, or graduates, ALL rights regarding records transfer to the student.

#### OTHER INFORMATION

- All transcript orders are <u>FREE</u> when obtained through the school or sent electronically through Parchment while enrolled within District 201.
- Official Transcripts will <u>NOT</u> be released a PERSONAL or a Student's BTHS email address. Colleges and state/federal facilities will not accept self-printed copies as official.

If you have questions regarding your transcript, test scores, or Parchment, should contact their Counselor or the campus Registrar.

- Send scores through your account.

# Letter of Recommendation



1. Fill out a Letter of Recommendation Request Form

(paper copy attached & electronic version available on BW Counseling website or by following this QR Code -



2. Give to the person you would like to write your letter

Letters can come from school, community or church Pick the person that knows you BEST

- 3. DO NOT simply drop a form into a teacher's mailbox or email. Approach them face to face during their free time.
- 4. Allow that person 2 weeks to complete the letter
- 5. Write your recommender a brief note of thanks
- 6. We STRONGLY urge you to waive the right to review, if they ask, because a confidential letter has more credibility

Not sure what you want to do after high school? Need help with financing training or college? Not sure if college is right for you?

You may be thinking about a path which does not include a 4 year college. Remember there are many ways to reach your destination. Here are some options:

- 1. **Earn while you Learn**: In-demand career fields like healthcare and technology, construction and manufacturing provide opportunities to train you and pay you at the same time. These can also be traditional apprenticeship opportunities in the manufacturing or construction related fields. - 2. **2 Year College/Trade School**: Students enter trade school or a community college to begin their studies and earn certificates for careers requiring short term training. Students will often go on to 4 year colleges from the community college.
- 3. **Military**: Many students choose a path in the military right after high school. Some want lifelong careers in the service while others use that opportunity to help them pay for college.
- 4. **Choose all of the above**. Some students will choose a little from each of the 4 options above to help them reach their career goals.

### **Straight to Work After High School Graduation**

- Spend some time putting together short and long term career goals
- Investigate different pathways to reaching your goals
- Get some help with putting together your professional resume
- Practice Interviewing
- Attend local career fairs
- Develop a LinkedIn profile
- Clean Up Social Media prior to applying for positions
- Develop a customized cover letter & resume for each position you are applying
- Identify a few people who might be able to serve as a strong reference for you
- Investigate ways to gain industry credentials and training while you are working

### Going on an Interview? Applying?

- Use NETWORKING skills
  - Contact people you know working at the desired company
  - Try to get a personal referral; personal referrals go a long way!
  - Check out the <u>listing of companies</u> who are hiring Belleville District #201 students. The list is in the student bulletin & on the school website! It is updated frequently.
- Make a Resume
  - Most applications are done online, so have your resume on hand and formatted to be copied and pasted in an online data system
  - Check out the <u>Belleville District #201 College and Career</u> website to help with resume writing
- Dress like you are getting the job!
  - When turning in your application or resume dress like you are getting an on the spot interview - Dress professionally!
  - Wear a nice collared or button down shirt and slacks
  - Make sure they remember you and not what you are wearing
  - Be polite & courteous
- Silence and put your cell phone in a pocket or purse
- BE CONFIDENT! Smile! Relax!
- Follow up!
